The term 'vulnerable' takes off!


The AVM (Alliance for Vulnerable Mission) which myself and a few colleagues founded in 2007, seems to have had an *extraordinary success* in promoting vulnerability in mission. Without having

researched it, the term was to my knowledge not really used to describe Christian mission before this time. Nowadays, it is very common. Here's an editorial by Jamie Pitts to an Anabaptist Journal that recently published the articles below:

"I'm pleased to announce that we've released our third issue of *Anabaptist Witness*. It's titled "What is Mission?: Evangelism, Justice, and Beyond. ... there seems to be an emerging consensus that mission involves vulnerable encounters with others."

• An article by Jim Harries on evangelism and social justice is found in Anabaptist Witness: Harries, Jim, 2016, 'Evangelism or Social Justice: reconsidering the case in Africa.' 57-70 In: Anabaptist Witness, What is mission: evangelism, justice, and beyond, 3(1), April 2016. Here is part of the conclusion: "... deep profound lasting sustainable relevance to a context needs to arise from within that context. Outside inputs must be appropriated in order to speak clearly. Even biblical models of working seemingly do not involve intercultural imposition of outside ideas and practices, but internally driven life transformation. The question of what is appropriate for Africa, between evangelism and social justice, seems to be irresolvable because it presupposes an absent distinction between "religion" and "secularism." Approaches to mission and

development vulnerable to local contexts are preferable to parameters of thinking that are designed by "outsiders.""
